
Warriors At A Glance

Jared Johnson









Campus Improvements >>>

ESU's campus is continuously transformed to better serve our students and community. Construction is progressing on the new University Center, which is slated to open for the Fall 2025 semester. The 156,233-gross-square-foot, stateof-the-art building will house most of ESU's student services in one location and also include a large ballroom, bookstore, theater, art gallery and food court. Recent renovations of existing buildings include accessibility improvements in the Abeloff Center for the Performing Arts, interior cosmetic renovations in Dansbury Commons, and updated branding in the Zimbar-Liljenstein Hall gymnasium, and the Schisler Museum of Wildlife and Natural History.
